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The History Behind Christmas

ditions and religious aspects. Christmas day, relating to the Christians, is celebrated as the anniversary of the birth of Christ. There are all those people who exchange gifts and family that is reunited for that particular time of the

year. As for the younger generation, Saint Nick is known to fly his reindeer-pulled sleigh and deliver presents during that muchawaited night.


The middle of winter has been a time celebrated around the world. Many are joyous about the beginning of longer days and much more sunlight. In Scandinavia, the Norse celebrated Yule, which starts December 21st (winter solstice) and goes through January. Fathers and sons would bring large logs and burn them in acknowledgement of the return of the sun. During the log burning, they would feast which could last as long as twelve days! The Norse thought that each spark from the inferno depicted a new calf or pig that would be born next year. A perfect time for most European celebrations were in December. During that time of year, cattle were slaughtered so they would not need to be fed in the winter

and provided a fresh supply of meat. This was also a time when most beer and wine was fermented enough to be used. The pagan god, Oden, is honored in Germany during mid-winter. Terrified of

> Oden, the Germans believed that he would fly across the night

sky and observe the people to see if thev

would flourish or rot. Since winters were not as harsh in Rome as those in the far north, a holiday in



beginning years of Christianity, Easter was a major religious holiday due to the birth of Jesus not being celebrated. However, in the fourth century, church officials petitioned to make Jesus's birthday a holiday even though there was not a date in the Bible. Even though there was speculation that his birth was in the spring, Pope Julius I picked December twentyfifth. Many believe that the church chose this date in order to absorb the traditions of the pagan Saturnalia celebration. The custom was first called the "Feast of Nativity" and it spread to Egypt in 432. Then to England in the

> sixth century. Christmas had spread to Scandinavia in the eighth century. Currently, Roman and Greek Orthodox churches celebrate Christmas thirteen days after the twenty -fifth (also known as

Three Kings Day).

In the early seventeenth century, religious reformation altered the way Christmas was celebrated in Europe. When the Puritans took over Europe in 1645, they also cancelled Christmas. Despite this, King Charles II restored the throne and brought back the holiday. Although Christmas was reestablished in Europe, the English separatists that went over to America in 1620, declared that Christmas will not be a holiday. After the American Revolution, Christmas was not celebrated.

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Santa Who?

Around this time of year, little kids are starting to write Santa a letter asking him to get them their most desired toys and gifts. They go to their local malls to take pictures with the famous guy in red. They even leave cookies and milk for him the night of Christmas Eve. But why do we admire the jolly old guy? And most importantly, where did he come from?

In around the 3rd century (280 A.D.) in Patara, which is near Myra in modern-day Turkey. A man named St. Nicholas became the subject of many legends because of his impeccable generosity. He had inherited a large sum of money in which later he traveled to the countryside helping the poor and ill. Over the course of years, Nicholas's popularity spread and he became known as the protector of children and sailors. His feast day is celebrated on the anniversary of his death, which is December 6th. This was thought to be a lucky day to make large purchases or to get married. By the Renaissance, St. Nicholas was the most beloved saint in all of Europe.

In December 1773, and again in 1774, a New York newspaper announced that groups of Dutch families had gathered to honor the anniversary of St. Nicholas death. The name Santa Claus emerged from Nick's Dutch nickname, Sinter Klaas, a shortened form of Sint Nikolaas (Dutch for Saint Nicholas). In 1809, a man

named Washington Irving, helped to spread the Sinter Klaas stories when he referred to St. Nicholas as the patron saint of New York in his book, The History of New York. Sinter Klaas was described as everything from a "rascal" with a blue three-cornered hat, red



waistcoat, and yellow stockings to a man wearing a broad-brimmed hat and a "huge pair of Flemish trunk hose."

Stores began to advertise Christmas shopping in 1820, and then by the 1840s, newspapers were creating separate segments for holiday advertisements, which often featured photographs of the newly-popular Santa Claus. In the early 1890s, the Salvation Army needed money to pay for the free Christmas meals they contributed to needy families. They began dressing up unemployed men in Santa Claus suits and sending them into the streets of New York to solicit donations. Those familiar Salvation Army Santas have been ringing bells on the street and corners of American cities ever since then. In 1822, Clement Clarke Moore, an Episcopal minister, wrote a

long Christmas poem for his

three daughters entitled "An Account of a Visit from St. Nicholas." He was originally hesitant to publish due to the frivolous nature of its subject, is largely responsible for our modern image of Santa Claus as a "right jolly old elf" with a portly figure and the

supernatural powers to ascend down a chimney with a mere nod of his head. His poem helped popularize the now-familiar image of a Santa Claus who flew from house to house on Christmas Eve—in "a miniature sleigh" led by eight flying reindeer—leaving presents of

all sorts for deserving children. In 1881, political cartoonist Thomas Nast drew on Moore's poem to

create the first image that matches our modern picture of Santa Claus. He made Santa look like he had a bright red suit trimmed with white fur, North Pole workshop, elves, and his wife, Mrs. Claus.

Hence, it turns out the jolly old man has a lengthy and complex history. So next time you see a mall Santa or a Salvation Army Santa, remember that they all originated for one man, St. Nicholas. And from one man wanting to do good he created the legendary Santa Claus. The man that watches very day and night, making sure that you either get the gift that you want or the most dreaded gift, coal. So make sure you don't end up on the Naughty List! And lastly, enjoy the holidays and spent time with your families.

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California Engulfed in Flames

On the East Coast of the United States, we seem to be doing just fine. Nothing extremely terrible is happening. On the west coast, however, it's not the same. Unfortunately, on November 8th

near Camp Creek Road in Butte, California is where our hysteria begins.

No one really knows how the Camp Fire, named after its origin on Camp Creek Road in California, began. But that isn't where our focus should be. We should focus on the 13,972 homes and 18,733 buildings that have been destroyed due to this enormous wildfire. The 2018 wildfire season is the most destructive wildfire season on rec-



ord in California, with a total of 7,579

fires burning an area of 1,667,855 acres, the largest amount of burned acreage recorded.

The fire left 88 dead, 249 injured, and 11 people still missing. As of November 25th, the Camp Fire was 100 percent contained after its first sparking. Celebrities such as Caitlyn Jenner, Khloé Kardashian, Kim Kardashian-West, Lady Gaga, and Miley Cyrus have also been affected by this tragedy.

Even more, Frances Stead Sellers, Scott Wilson, and Tim Craig wrote in the Post, noting that more than 120 American what appears to be a people have contracted Red Cross highly contagious infection called norovirus at

> the evacuation facilities. Sometimes known as the stomach flu or the stomach bug, norovirus causes pain in the stomach area with symptoms including vomiting and diarrhea. More than 40 people have been moved to the hospital for medical support.

To help all the people affected by this catastrophe you should, with a parent/guardian's permission, donate to the American Red Cross and/or the Humane Society. This will definitely help all those who are in need of your support.


Avengers: Endgame is going to be the greatest Marvel movie of 2019. Marvel fans cannot wait for this final chapter. Many peo-


The holidays are supposed to be a time of joy and happiness. Tragically, this world lost a lot of great role models throughout the holiday season.



leaves from the past.







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
