
To be honest, the candles did smell good and shooting at things with rubber band guns was even more fun, but that's it for Colonial Days. Next stop? The Civil War!






Behind the screen of NLMS's DNN



'Her Arms' could be an outlet for teens' safe expression

To Write Love on Her Arms (TWLOHA) is an American nonprofit organization. They aim to bring hope for people struggling with addiction, depression, self injury, thoughts of suicide and more. TWLOHA wants to connect people to treatment centers, websites, books, support groups and other resources to help them through what they are going through. TWLOHA encourages people to have honest conversations about what issues they have and what goes on in their community.

TWLOHA has had very many promineces through bands like Boys Like Girls, One Republic, the members of Paramore, Jon Foreman, from Switchfoot, Sean from The Blackout, Derek Sanders from Mayday Parade, Deon Rexroat from Anberlin, Amy Lee from Evanescence, Bryce Avary from The Rocket Summer, Miley Cyrus, Casey Calvery from Hawthorne Heights, Kevin Skaff from A Day To from Brazil - and musicians include A Skylit Drive, Between the Trees, who wrote songs about Renee Yohe, "A Time For Yohe," as well as the song "The Way She Feels." The Rocket Summer, Fireflight, The Almost, Underoath, Bayside, As We Collide, The Red Jumpsuit Apparatus, and many more.

TWLOHA was founded by Jamie Tworkowski in March of 2006. To that date, the seeds of the group were sown by a story written by Tworkowski, about 19-year-old Renee Yohe, who struggled with addiction, depression,

self-injury, and attempted suicide. Tworkowski's story, was written in February of 2006, with chronicles of Yohe's life five days before she entered treament. Unable to get Yohe checked into a treatment center, friends offered support.

'We became her hospital and the possibility of healing fills our living room with life. It is unspoken and there are only a few of us, but, we will be her

church, the body of Christ coming alive to meet her needs, to write Love on her arms," said Jamie Tworkowski, founder of TWLOHA.

T-shirts were printed and sold in Orlando to fund Yohe's drug treatment, a MySpace page was created to serve as a home page for the project. Bands such as **Anberlin** and **Switchfoot** showed their support and began wearing TWLOHA T-shirts right away. Their MySpace and Facebook pages began to receive messages and comments from teens and

young adult with the same problems that Yohe faced. TWLOHA has heard from young teens and adults in all 50 states and many from Canada, Mexico, Australia and the United Kingdom and more.




September 10-17 has been called "TWLOHA Week" and teens and young adults write "Love" on their arms to show love and hope of others. "Love Is The Movement," "Rescue Is Possible," "Hope Is Real, Help Is Real," and "Stop The Bleeding" are slogans used often by the organization.

To Write Love On Her Arms has helped many teens in our community. People don't want

felt about them," Mrs. Marushak said, so she had her students research the product.


They found that people were buying the "Boobie" bands for \$4


2012: Is the end of our world really near?

If you believe this, please stop worrying about it. If you don't believe my opinion, it looks like you're just going to have to wait and find out...




As you crush their spirit, do you really know them?

You also need to consider that others have problems. They might have a bad home life, someone they're close to might be ill, or they could just be having problems with their friends.



I love you so much, and I'll never lose hope, never give up. I love you, and I need you. Thank you for inspiring me.




3-D movies: Too much coming off the screen?
