If a family has a child that needs chemotherapy, it would cost \$771 a day for treatment.

Also, for a child who needs oxygen, it would cost \$435 a day.

The Math-a-Thon program makes it possible for St. Jude's to treat their patients regardless of the family's ability to pay for treatments. This program teaches students to lend a helping hand to


those in need and as an added bonus, it also helps to enhance their math skills.

We went to a lot of different


stations for difference subjects. They were soil, woods and trees, water, aquatic animals, and regular animals.

Maybe the parent can make the child feel guilty which would make them try to become active.


Either way, the child should be active at least once a day.

You might as well never find a solution to the problem. And when you're not reading or living life, you feel alone but when you're reading, you feel as if you belong there.


You see all that is written around you. You bring the character to life. You make a journey. And at the end of life and that book, you find values all around you.
