
Sharing hearts with the homeless

Students learn all they 'knead' to know about baking bread

to school to be donated to a soup kitchen. They got to make bread, pizza or cinnamon rolls with their portion of the bread dough.


So next time you want some homemade bread, don't go to a bakery... go to the seventh-graders!



On January 15, the Enrichment class took a field trip to the Times News and the TV13 News Station. We learned about anything that has to do with getting information from reporters to everyday people like us.

Our first stop was the Times News building. Here, we learned how all of our news is printed, from the newspapers on our porches and brochures for events, to wedding invitations and business cards. One of the most interesting things that our group saw was the "roll room." Here the newspaper company keeps all the

paper used to print. Each roll of paper weighs about 3,000 pounds, costs \$1.35 per square foot (anywhere from \$3,000 to \$5,000 for the whole roll) and they use about two a day. However, they don't kill trees. All of their paper is recycled, and all of their paper scraps get taken away and recycled again. The workers at Times News put together the papers, try to "reclaim" previous customers, help to run the many machines at the company, print inserts for papers, and get advertisements for the many newspapers and brochures. Advertisements pay for almost everything that needs money at the company. Printing news is a real team effort

Our next stop was the TV13 News Station. At the beginning of our tour, we met the people responsible for collecting all the news that is broadcast on the show. After that, we saw the control room. While the show is being broadcast, the director, producer, and a few other important people sit in this room to control the show. They make the graphics appear on the screen, or roll footage during the show. Our final visit in the tour was, of course, the actual set where the news is filmed live, each day.

The room was very bright, and had about four or five flat





North team math teacher Mrs. Kuntz added, "I believe that this effort is an excellent way for students to hone their math skills while also helping very ill children."




