It is possible that if they don't have a heat resource, they can die. Baby and newborn snakes cannot eat mice; instead they eat a thing called a "pinky," which is a newborn mouse. 

Mr. Graver said that moving was tough but the awesome teachers on SouthEast helped him. He said it is different because of now teaching eighth grade.


"It's also different because of their field trip," Mr. Graver said, "and having two grades on the team."

Books, minds remain open 'After the Bell'


