in Honolulu. Hawaii. He was born to his mother Ann Dunham of Kansas, and his father. Barack Obama Sr. of Kenya. At the age of two, his father and mother split up, and his father moved back to Kenya. At the age of six, he and his mother moved to Indonesia where they suffered a great amount of poverty. They returned back to Hawaii when he was ten. In 1983, Obama graduated from Columbia University in New York City with a bachelor's degree in political science. He then moved to Chicago, Illinois, where he became the director of a program designed to help the poor. Obama left Chicago to attend Harvard Law School in Massachusetts. In 1991, Obama graduated from Harvard and

returned to Chicago to practice law. He now has a wife and two children, and he is also running for president with running mate Joe Biden by his side.

The Republican running for president is John McCain. John McCain III was born on August 29, 1936 in the Panama Canal Zone. He was born to his mother Roberta McCain and his father John McCain Jr. In the 1960s and 1970s. McCain served in the Vietnam War; during the time he was captured and held prisoner for over five years. When he was released in 1973, McCain was decorated with several medals of valor, given to McCain for his bravery as a Prisoner of War and his service as a navy commander. In 1981. McCain retired from the Navy and moved to Arizona, where he



set out to begin a political career. Running as a Republican, he was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1982 and then to the U.S. Senate in 1986. McCain also earned a bachelor's degree in 1958 and become a naval pilot. McCain has seven children and four grandchildren, and lives in Phoenix with his second wife, Cindy. He is running for president with running mate Sarah Palin by his side.

Each of the presidential candidates has different views on the issues in our world today. Obama would like to pull our troops out of Iraq. McCain wants to continue fighting the war in Iraq. Both McCain and Obama want to make sure everyone in the US has health insurance. They both want to also limit the use of greenhouse gases to stop global warming.

McCain wants to lower taxes to those who pay income taxes. Obama wants to raise taxes to those who make \$227,000 or more yearly, and anyone who makes lower than that would get a tax cut.
