"I think it was as successful as it could be with all the craziness going on... I think the kids did a good job, and we did a good job with being flexible. I think we did phenomenal here at the Mid-




dle School."



What are some of your favorite memories as an educator for the district?

One of my favorite memories as an ESL teacher was seeing the look on a student's face when they realized they were answering questions in fluent English without having to translate in their head. One of my favorite memories as the ACE advisor was working with the ACE team to prepare for the competition. While they didn't always place, they always worked as a team and supported each other. Overall, I am very proud of them.

What are you proud of doing for the district?

I am proud that I was given the opportunity to help so many students in both the ESL and gifted programs and that I was always welcomed in every building. I am very grateful that the school district had the faith in me to meet the needs of so many students.

Overall, how was your experience teaching?

I loved working at Northern Lehigh. I enjoyed coming to work and working with students. My years were wonderful, and I never had a bad day.

How has the pandemic affected the staff and how did you change that?

There was a lot of anxiety and

uneasiness of how to approach things. And failing the kids. We're getting through this together. Take care of yourself, step back. My job was to support them and get them to the best they could. Sometimes they need a hug. Out of the entire district, our staff I had no one whose fear overtook them to not show up. They always thought of the kids first. They were here everyday and killing it."

How challenging was it to make changes to the middle school considering it is in the middle and in a pandemic?

"We didn't have to make too many changes. A lot of other buildings had to change schedules and try to incorporate virtual students. We didn't have to change anything on that aspect. There was no huge transition, you had the same teachers on the get-go. The only change was the cafeteria seating, and that didn't take long. It wasn't as dramatic a change as the other buildings.

Do you think we did well with club and sport arrangements?

"I think with the pandemic, everyone was flexible to allow virtually. Even with sports they waited until it was safe. And a lot had to do with the parents. Our parents and the families stepped up so their kids and family could have a normal season. It was everybody working together to make it successful. This year some kids realized grades were important.

Do you believe that we'll be using virtual aspects in the future, after the pandemic?

"I think there will always be a virtual component from now on. We had no snow days because we could work from home. I would hope they would continue with the virtual to some point."

Just recently (as of March), our school was able to go back


Looking Back: An 8th Grade Reflection

Summer Desserts DIY Dishes!

Lemon Blueberry Mini Cheesecakes 3. Using a small spoon, dollop a small amount of blueberry preserves into the center of each cheesecake. Use a toothpick (or a

small skewer) to swirl.

Refrigerate until firm, about 4 hours.

2. Peel and quarter apples, then squeeze lemon juice over them to prevent browning. Cut core out of each quarter, then place core side down on cutting board. Place one chopstick on either side of apple quarter, then cut thin slices, being careful not to cut all the way through. Repeat until all apple quarters are sliced.

3. In a large bowl, beat together butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs one at a time,



until fully combined, then beat in sour cream and vanilla.

4. In a medium bowl, whisk to combine flour, baking powder, and salt. Add dry

ingredients to wet ingredients and fold in with a spatula until just combined.

5. Transfer batter to prepared springform and smooth top. Add apples sliced side up in desired pattern. Bake until a toothpick inserted into the center of the cake comes out clean, about 1 hour.

6. Transfer cake to cooking rack and remove springform ring. Let cool to room temperature before dusting with powdered sugar.

2. In a large bowl, beat cream cheese with a hand mixer until smooth, then beat in powdered sugar, lemon juice, lemon zest, vanilla, and salt. Add heavy cream and beat until fluffy and stiff peaks form. Spoon cream cheese mixture over Oreos. German Apple Cake

1. Preheat oven to 350° and grease a 9"-x-13" baking dish with cooking spray. Combine peaches along with

stirring occasionally, for 15 minutes.

-Refrigerate the blueberry mixture until it is totally and completely chilled. You may speed up the process by putting it in the freezer, stirring every 10 minutes, for about 45 minutes.

-Mix together your chilled blueberry mixture and chilled yogurt, then freeze the mixture in your ice cream maker according to your manufacturer's instructions. Serve immediately for a soft serve texture, or transfer the frozen yogurt to a freezer-safe container and freeze for several hours for a scoopable con-

sistency.

Peach Raspberry Sorbet

Ingredients: -6 Medium, ripe peaches (about 2.5 pounds)

-6 Ounces fresh raspberries (one small container)

-³/₄ cup of Raw (Turbinado) Sugar

syrup and cinnamon in prepared baking dish and stir to combine.

2. Pour cake mix over peaches in an even layer. Layer butter evenly on top.

3. Bake until the fruit is bubbly and the cake is cooked through, 50 to 55 minutes.

4.Serve with ice cream.

-²/₃ Cup water -Juice of ¹/₂ Lemon

Instructions:

-Peel and Slices peaches into cubes -Combine peaches, raw sugar, and water in a medium saucepan. Cover and cook on medium heat for a little over 10 minutes, until the peaches are soft.

-Remove the peach mixture from heat and let it cool, stirring occasionally.

-In the meantime, puree the raspberries in a blender. Filter out the seeds by pouring the raspberry puree through a fine mesh colander. Press the liquid through the colander with the back of a big spoon or spatula, and then discard the seeds.

-Once the peaches have cooled, combine the raspberry puree and peach mixture in a blender. Blend until smooth, and chill the mixture in the fridge.

-Put it in an ice cream maker and follow the instructions. Enjoy!




