What's your favorite type of music? Heavy Metal


Which high school did you attend? Northern Lehigh High School

The Disturbing Backstory Behind an Abandoned Pennsylvania Ghost Town

59 years ago, on May 27th, 1962, a tragic mine fire turned a once-prosperous coalmining town into an almost abandoned ghost of its past self. Perhaps the beginning of Centralia's long list of misfortunes starts in the 1860s when a secret Irish society called the Molly Maguires induced a wave of crime upon the pleasant little town. This wave of crime ranged from the murder of the town's

founder, Alexander Rae, to the untimely death of the area's first priest, and everything in between. Finally, in 1877, several suspected leaders of the Mollies were executed and the crime wave abated. However, Centralia's history of tragedy had only just begun. The next in line of Centralia's unfortunate disasters is one of the less-remembered ones, mostly be-



cause of the minor effect it had on the town. This event was called the Great Depression, and it traveled quickly through many mining towns, disrupting their business and shaking their economy. While Centralia was impacted by the Depression, the town performed a miraculous recovery, and it resumed its business, flourishing as much as it ever had before.

Finally, we reach the most imprinting tragic occurrence in Centralia's history: the devastating mine fire that topped all else. There are many theories about how this fire started, but perhaps the most believable hypothesis starts with an excess amount of municipal waste. This abundance of garbage caused many unregulated landfills, which in turn resulted in an increase in rat population, a corral of unwanted odors, and many complaints from the residents of the town. Eventually, the Centralia city council decided to take charge of the waste overflow. They proposed a plan to rid the city of its rat population and multitude of scents in time for its residents' memorial day festivities.

A Short and Brief History of the Chaos in Afghanistan

If you haven't heard about it already, there's a lot going on in Afghanistan, and it has been for years. There's been many invasions, government takeovers, and insurrections against these governments. However, the big discussion of the topic is the recent pullout from the area, and the catastrophe it caused. We'll not only be talking about this but also what has all led up to these events. To start, let's focus on the first big conflict that occurred in Afghanistan: the Soviet-Afghan war.

The Soviet-Afghan war has been considered by some to be the "USSR's Vietnam," suggesting it went very badly. It all started on the first day of 1965, when the People's Democratic Party of Afghanistan, was formed. It was a Marxist-Leninist organization that had already become fairly popular in the 1965's parliamentary elections, in which they won four seats. To make it clear before we get into the war itself- there were two factions to this party- the hardline Khalq, and the moderate Parcham. The Parcham wanted a peaceful and moderate rise to power, where the Khalq believed in the violent overthrow of the government. With the help of the military, they did and formed the Democratic Republic of Afghanistan in 1978.

The PDPA made many "radical" reforms, like toppling the feudal system, giving rights to women,

and raising education funding to make sure everyone could read. (All of this may sound good, and granted these things are good.)

It's important to keep in mind this is a Marxist Leninist state, meaning the markets were under total control of the state, which was very authoritative.) However, the big "radical reform," was to form a secular state. A secu-

They had a much larger military than the DRA and had some of the best tanks, guns, planes, and(if needed) nukes. The Afghans had previously made treaties with the Soviets, which allowed them to call them for assistance in any situation needed. However, there was an

> issue with this. The general secretary of the government, Amin, was fairly unpopular and his handling of the insurgencies caused his government to be fairly unpopular. The Soviets weren't happy with that, so before they helped the Afghans, they first killed Amin, something referred to



lar state is a state where religion has no role in the government. Now, when you tell a bunch of Islamists that women will be granted rights, that may not go

over well. Tell them that the mosque won't have power in the state and you're probably going to have a very bad time. Many protested the PDPA's coup, as a large portion of conservatives wanted to keep the government structure. The PDPA repressed many political opponents. This resulted in multiple parties, widely referred to as mujahideen groups, revolting and starting a civil war.

However, the DRA had one way



as the Palace Coup. This

Palace Coup made the country even more unstable than it was previously,

giving the mujahideen a significant advantage. The Mujahideen was also being provided with equipment by the Americans. In 1989, the Soviets withdrew from Afghanistan, even though the civil war was still ongoing. Both the US and the USSR continued to fund the mujahideen and DRA respectively. However, in 1992 the DRA fell, and the mujahideen took over Afghanistan.

One could argue this wasn't the end of the civil war. Those mujahideen groups that were previously allies, became enemies. After the Soviet-Afghan War ended, mujahideen groups made a rush for Kabul, resulting in the formation of the Islamic State of Afghanistan. However, fighting still occurred, and the "new civil war" raged on. However, a new faction known as the Taliban had popped up, and they were gaining a lot of power very quickly. By 1995, the Taliban had successfully taken over the government. The Taliban enforce strict rules, based on their interpretations of the Quran. They began outlawing the cultivation of poppies(Which were being used to make opium), and

enforcing stricter punishments for lawbreakers. However, the saddest of all these is that women had lost most of their rights. They could no longer go to school, or have a job.

A few years later, a figure you may know is exiled from Sudan. Many believed he was hiding in Afghanistan, The figure founded a jihadist group to topple western governments throughout the Middle East. The man's name was Osama bin Laden, and he was one of the founders of al-Qaeda. al-Qaeda eventually became tied to the Taliban through a bay'ah, which is a pledge of allegiance to a person or group. This pledge by al-Qaeda made them a subordinate group to the Taliban. This was great for them, as another civil war was already on the rise. The Islamic State's supporters now moved to the northern section of the country, referring to themselves as the

Northern Alliance. The two previous factions continued to fight for another five years. Nothing significant happened until 2001 when the leader named Massoud a position as prime minister. However, Massoud declined, claiming that the only way Afghanistan would be stable or fair was through democratic means.

Sadly on September 9th of that year, he was killed during an interview with two members of al-Qaeda. They had killed him with a bomb hidden inside the camera. Massoud was considered a national hero; he had voluntarily given up a powerful position, to protect democracy.



A larger tragedy happened two days later. On September 11th, two planes crashed into the Twin Towers. Both of them fell shortly after. The Pentagon was also attacked, resulting in 184 deaths. Passengers on a fourth plane successfully stopped the plane from hitting its target, which is presumed to be the Capitol or White House. They sadly paid with their lives. 9/11 is considered by some to be the most horrific day in American history. Then-president George W. Bush demanded the Taliban give up Osa-

ma Bin Laden and shut down terrorist training camps across the country. The Taliban only acknowledged the demand of Osama bin Taliban offered a Northern Alliance Laden. Before they would hand him in, they would ask for "solid evidence of his involvement" before even considering it. The Americans were quite certain bin Laden had planned the attacks. However, instead of giving the Taliban certain proof, they began planning for an invasion.

> On October 7th, 2001, airstrikes struck Kabul, Kandahar, and Jalalabad. Shortly after, the 3rd Ranger Battalion onto an airstrip south of Kandahar, known as Objective Rhino. In November, the cities of Mazar-i Sharif, Kabul, and Tarinkot. After this, they took Qala-i Jangi and Tora Bora. The Taliban government fell apart shortly after, ending the war and beginning the occupation.

> Now we skip past around twenty years to look at what's happening today. Poppy farms have been forced to shut down, women's rights are in the process of being eliminated, and the Taliban's interpretation of the Quran is turning into law. The two sides are polarized. While Democrats blame Trump, Republicans blame Biden. A Marine has faced a court-martial for criticizing our recent withdrawal from the region. The former president of Afghanistan has gone into hiding, and suicide bombers have been blowing up mosques and Taliban checkpoints for over a month now. Who's fault is all of this?

tary. Plenty of commanders had reported on a false number of troops (Mostly higher numbers than what they had) to get more supplies, which they could waste away. Although troops had more equipment to work with, it resulted in supply shortages. "Ghost soldiers," also harmed the state of the military. These are soldiers who are not on active duty. It is assumed they were used to get more funds to an officer or other authoritative figure.

Another contributing factor to the collapse is the Doha Agreement, which was supported and (to my knowledge) proposed by Trump. The agreement allowed five thousand Taliban prisoners to be released from prison, and also began leaving troops out early. Knowing that these prisoners were a part of the Taliban, it's safe to assume most would simply rejoin their units shortly after. While making diplomacy with the Taliban was a necessary move to getting out of Afghanistan, it allowed the Taliban to retaliate against the Republic easier.

They indeed retaliated, and as the Afghans retreated, they took things we left behind. US troops had also begun evacuating, allowing the Taliban to access more guns, ammo, and vehicles. It is estimated three thousand Humvees went unaccounted for, alongside seven thousand rifles and machine guns. When the Republic collapsed, Joe Biden ordered six thousand troops to go back into Afghanistan to help evacuate aid workers, interpreters, and other assistants. Many remain in Afghanistan, still asking for help from the West. During the evacuation, suicide bombings occurred in Kabul by members of ISIS-K, killing 169 Afghans and 13 American servicemen. Biden threatened ISIS-K by saying they would strike back. They later did, on the 27th and 29th of August. The first was successful, however, the latter killed seven children, alongside three innocent civilians.

There are not many ways to put the catastrophe that happened in Afghanistan. Although pulling out of Afghanistan was a great way to ensure the lives of Americans were safe, it resulted in the deaths of hundreds of people- some of them being our own. No matter where you stand on the situation, most people can agree it went very badly. Although I can't think of many appropriate words to describe the situation, I did think of one. **The word is chaos.**

this point, your factory doesn't help the cereal stock market much, but a very nice government official decides to approve your bailout anyway. As the producer of your ingredients relied on you for profit, they'll probably lift them out of bankruptcy as well. Now, several things might happen here. Either they'll force your supplier to hire workers to make sure their food is safe, costing them more money, or they'll make you hire these extra workers. They may even force you to change suppliers, which will probably send them out of business.

ment grants you a bailout to protect the economy, it also puts restrictions on what you can do and sell. For example, since your food has been dubbed unsafe for consumption, they'll stop you from selling it until you can find better and safer ingredients. This doesn't seem good to you, but restrictions can theoretically save you from getting a bad reputation. That might not make sense, but the gov- that away. ernment protecting you from selling potentially dangerous products will guarantee nobody consumes it in the first place. If nobody's consuming it and getting sick, you may not get yourself a bad reputation. While this isn't going to help your cereal factory very much, this is

great for new companies and consumers, as it protects them from selling or buying anything possibly dangerous. Strengthing market regulation today is associated typically with modern liberals, so odds are if you're very successful, you'll literally pay the price. This is because most liberals tend to raise taxes on richer people, so if you have a lot of money you'll be giving some of that away.

The explanations above are pretty vague, and there are many other capitalist models. However, to sum up, the situations I just described, you own your own business, and sell the product for money. The state has nothing to do with what you sell in a laissez-faire economy. If you make good economic and social decisions, it could go very well. However, if you were to go bankrupt, the government wouldn't be there to back you up. With a regulated market, there are more restrictions on what you do and sell, which can make it hard for a larger company to keep growing. However, consumers are protected from buying bad products or being mistreated.

North Korea is ruled by what is practically a monarch, and the Soviets ruled with an iron fist. China is very authoritative, not even allowing children to play video games more than half an hour a day (However, keep in mind the Chinese use a socialist market economy, which is NOT the same as outright socialchists and libertarian Marxists do exist. Some of these groups are somewhat popular, however, the big difference is that they do not have a vanguard party or Communist party.

On the subject of the Communist party, let's move to Communismworkers' self-management, while others believe in a vanguard party or communist party to help pave the way to a constitutional republic. However, all of them are based on common ownership, the abolition of money, social classes, and eventuallythe state.

I don't know if it's possible to say it was good for a business owner or leader in this case, so instead, we'll go with you being a worker. For starters, you have protected rights and don't have to buy anything. However, you can't buy anything, so the pride of buying a house or car, won't exist. Eventually, if you and your fellow workers make enough, Marx's theories come into play. Once enough is made, there won't be a need to buy stuff, and people will just take as they need, and after

this, there won't be a need for a government, and they would give up their power. Let's say that you reach this theoretical utopia, and you need twenty boxes of cereal. Since we're here, why don't I explain the role these have in our politics? We'll start with the big two: the Democrats and the Republicans. While the two are separated primarily by social issues, they do have some slightly different economic interests. Most Republicans are considered conservatives, meaning they want to keep the country the way it is right now, especially economically. While a lot want to deregulate our economy, it isn't a top priority. Many Democrats are known as modern liberals, some of which would like to continue regulating the economy. Of course, these two parties can be split up more. Some Republicans have very polarized opinions. They are normally against elitism, meaning they support egalitarianism (The one not important right now) and populism (The one important right now). These are known, funnily enough, as populists, specifically right-wing or national populists. While they aren't undemocratic, they do disagree with some aspects of liberal democracy. However, they still support large corporations, unlike



left-wing populists. They are also typically anti-immigration, and work to help the people of their nation, and satisfy their needs. This "populism" thing may not sound too good because of that last sentence. However, there are two things to keep in mind: 1. These are national populists, a group of populists, they do not represent all populists, and 2. Populism has been incorporated into many political doctrines, like liberalism, socialism, and is in many nationalist ideologies.

Next to that is left-wing or socialist populism, which isn't as popular in the US. They believe corporate shareholders should make decisions, instead of corporate managers. They also can be considered egalitarians (Now important), which is a concept that suggests that all people are created equally, and have the same worth and moral status. They also have some socialist theory tied in somewhere, although it takes much less of a priority than most left-wing ideologies.

The Democrats have a few democratic socialists in their party, however, the group we'll be talking about is the progressive movements in the party. Progressivism advocates social reforms, and attempts to curb the "constant battle between the privileged and unprivileged." Many progressives hate laissez-faire Capitalism and believe that government intervention must be made to stop corporations from gaining more power or causing monopolies. This can be tied into social democracy, a "socialist" ideology that promotes the ideas of a mixed economy (One where private and public sectors are both present). Social democrats promote tax raises on the wealthy, creating mixed economies, and raising spending on healthcare, education, and welfare.

This all might seem quite useless. Granted, if you don't pay attention to politics, it kind of is. Socialists and communists aren't going to matter as of now, especially in the United States. However, it's very important to have a grasp on politics. Even the slightest clue of what's going on in politics can help you to figure out who to vote for, who to support, and what parties to support. Although it may not seem significant on the surface, it is. Absorbing this information, along with anything else you may learn can help you look smart in conversations, but using this information may change how you live your life.

Right now, I have 69 fields in my farm and you acquire more as you proceed through the levels. Your fields are for planting crops. Wheat, corn, soybeans, sugarcane, carrots, indigo, pumpkins, cotton, chili peppers, tomatoes, strawberries, and potatoes are the crops I am able to plant. These plants are stored in your silo, but they aren't the only products stored there.

Trees and Bushes

Trees and bushes are plantable items that produce fruits. The types of trees and bushes I have are apple trees, raspberry bushes, cherry trees, blackberry bushes, and coffee bean bushes. The items you collect from these plants are stored in your silo and you are able to harvest them twice. After two harvests, you're able to ask for help, which someone from another farm can click on the tree/bush to revive it. You are then able to do two more harvests, then the tree/bush dies for good and you need to cut it down with an axe or saw.

Barn and Silo Storage

Now, you can't just keep piling up supplies in your barn and silo. You can upgrade both with special and expensive items to give you more storage, which is vital for gameplay. Your silo holds all of your crops and fruit from trees/bushes, and your barn holds everything else that you can sell.

Coins, Diamonds, XP, Vouchers, and Boosters

One of the most essential things in the game, currency. Coins are acquired by selling items, helping other farmers, and filling orders. Coins are the most important currency in the game, having a low amount of coins is not good for your farm because they are the foundation of the game. You use coins to buy things like production buildings, animal pens, animals, crops, trees, bushes, and special items. Diamonds are a rare type of currency in the game that allows you to speed things up and start production for things you don't have the ingredients for. If you download this game, don't waste your diamonds! They can be really important to saving you at the last minute. XP is given to you for basically everything you do. XP is put at a bar on top of the screen to proceed you to the next level. Vouchers are used to buy extra things as in pets or decor. Boosters are found in mystery boxes.

Farm Visitors, Truck, and Boat Orders Truck and boat orders are your second main source of income. Truck orders are orders that you need to make and gather items to fulfill the commission. You gain XP and coins for these orders. Truck orders have no expiration time, but your boat, however, does. Every four hours you have a boat that comes around and stays for 16 hours. During the four hour waiting time it gives you what items you need for the boat order, but not the amount; tedious, I know. You will usually have 3-4 crates of each of the three items you need ranging from 1-20 items per crate. You must fill all of the crates to send the boat away. Each crate you fill gives you coins and XP, but if you fill all of the crates and send the boat off before the time runs out, you get a tremendously larger amount of coins and XP. Farm visitors are NPCs who come into your farm to request certain things from you.

Mine, Fishing Boat, and Farm Expansions

The mine, the fishing boat, and farm expansions are similar because to use them you need to use special items and vouchers. When you unlock the mine you can use TNT, dynamite, and shovels, which are also used to clean up around your farm. You get ores from the mine and can make metal bars in the smelter. The fishing boat needs lures for the fish, so you make them by paying with vouchers. Fishing is one of my favorite parts of the game because you actually cast the line and have to drag the fish to the middle of a circle. It seems easy, but sometimes it's not. Farm expansions are unlocked by getting a certain amount of land deeds, marker stakes, and mallets to open up a new section to disperse your farm over. You don't always need to expand your farm, but you will have to eventually.

Helping Farms

You know how I said to revive your trees/bushes someone from another farm can come click on it? You can do that to other peoples farms too. You and other people can also ask for help on boat crates and truck orders. The maximum number of times you can simultaneously ask for random people's farms help is three, but you can ask for help from your neighborhood once after that. If you help out a tree/bush the person sends you a thank you letter, which gets you tickets to buy mystery boxes. If you help out someone else you get the coins and XP for that truck order/crate plus the ticket. When visiting other people's farms, make sure to keep a close eye out for mystery chests. Some chests require diamonds to open, but some are completely free to open and can get you special items, diamonds, vouchers, or boosters!

Neighborhood and Derby

Neighborhoods are where you and other players can get together and compete in a derby and help each other out. If you win the derby against other neighborhoods, you can get special items for you and your neighborhood. I am in a neighborhood with my dad, sister and I. Our neighborhood is pretty small, but the amount of time we play this game helps us compete with other neighborhoods.

Dogs, Cats, Horses, Puppies, and Donkeys

You can purchase these pets with vouchers and feed them every few hours, let them sleep, and wake them up for XP which gets you to proceed through the levels. You need to buy houses for them all, which are pretty expensive, but it can make gameplay fun. I have five dogs and two cats. My dog's names are Chicken, Rooster, Hen, Egg, and Omelette. My cat's names are Lydia and Tallie.

Decorations

Decorations are not in any way essential to gameplay, but you can get small amounts of XP, and, to me, it makes gameplay more light-hearted and fun. You can pay coins, vouchers, or even diamonds to get decorations. Since I consider myself somewhat of a fashionista, I spend a lot of time organizing and decorating my farm. You can also move any of your production buildings, trees, bushes, and decorations whenever you want.

I feel as though this game is really fun and you should download it too. I'm not a big gamer, but anyone can play this game. It gets easy when you get the mechanics down and becomes really fun really quick. There's a lot of potential fun in this game, and you should totally download it.

DIY Fall Crafts

As the autumn season rolls around, we begin to see a lot of fallrelated decorations. They range from autumnal to Halloweenthemed, and vary in size, color, material, and means of possession, but it still remains true for all ornaments that they are each fall-related. That being said, many people don't put up decorations. Whether they don't own decorations, don't support the fall season, don't have time to put up decorations, or just simply don't want to deal with the hassle of putting up and taking down pointless plastic trinkets each year, there's validity to most reasons for a lack of seasonal festivity. However, I take it upon myself to make sure that only those problems that cannot be solved remain and that the others are taken care of. For exam-

ple, a lack of decorations should never stop you from expressing your admiration and enthusiasm for a holiday or season. All things considered, I am here today to show you 2 ways you can transform an old glass jar into a beautiful fall decoration. container you can find around the house will work as well. I would al recommend washing or at least rin ing this jar before using it. For this craft, I would prefer to use burlap autumn-colored/patterned ribbon, but you could also use any kind of

Fall Jar #1: Autumnal Welcome

Supplies: 1 hot glue gun, 1 pair of scissors, 1 washed glass or plastic jar, 1 spool of ribbon, and 1 large flower or leaf.

Notes: If you do not have access to a hot glue gun, you can use a glue bottle or glue stick as an alternative.

I would recommend using a spaghetti sauce jar, salsa jar, peanut butter jar, or mason jar during this craft, but any other kind of clear jar or



container you can find around the house will work as well. I would also recommend washing or at least rinsing this jar before using it. For this craft, I would prefer to use burlap or autumn-colored/patterned ribbon, but you could also use any kind of thick ribbon. For this project, you could either use a fake flower or leaf or a real one. However, if you are using a flower, be sure to cut the stem as close to the flower itself as possible.

Step #1: Position the end of your ribbon so that it lays flat on your jar. Then, wrap the ribbon around your jar once in a horizontal circle, leaving

approximately 1 ¹/₂ inches of overlap between the two layers. Apply a drop of glue on the jar where the first layer would sit. Once the first drop of

glue has dried, add a second one on top of the first layer of ribbon where the second layer would sit. Trim off any excess ribbon not held in place by the glue. Next, wait for both of the glue drops to fully dry.

Step #2: Turn your jar so that the overlapping pieces of ribbon are on its backside. Position your flower or leaf on top of the ribbon. If your flower or leaf does not end up in the desired place, you can always turn your jar when you display it, changing the flower or leaf's position on the jar without removing it. Next, place a drop of glue on your jar where you would like to place your flower or leaf. Gently press your flower or leaf onto the jar

where the drop of glue is. Then, let your glue fully dry.

Step #3: If the petals of your flower or the edges of your leaf are not sticking to the ribbon, apply a thin layer of glue onto them or onto the ribbon underneath them and press the petals or edges onto the jar. Repeat this process several times in little increments until you have gone around the entire edge or line of petals.

Recipe of the Month: Pumpkin Cookies

Pumpkin Cookies with Cream Cheese Frosting:

Ingredients for the Cookies: 1 cup butter, softened, 2/3 cup packed brown sugar, 1/3 cup sugar, 1 large egg, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract, 1 cup canned pumpkin, 2 cups all-purpose flour, 1-1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon baking powder

Ingredients for the Frosting: 1/4 cup of softened butter, 4 ounces softened cream cheese, 2 cups confectioners sugar, and 1-1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract.

Directions: In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Add pumpkin; mix well. Combine the flour, cinnamon, baking soda, salt, and baking powder; gradually add to the creamed mixture and mix well.

Put them 2 inches apart on a cookie sheet. Bake at 350 for 8-10 min, or until edges are light brown.

In a small bowl, beat the frosting ingredients until light and fluffy. Frost cookies. Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator.

Fall Jar #2: Autumn Woods

Supplies: 1 pair of scissors, 1 washed glass or plastic jar, 1 container of Modge Podge or other clear-drying glue, 1 paintbrush, 3-5 leaves, 1 sheet of paper, 1 circular wood slice, 1 small battery-operated candle, and 1 spool of twine or thin ribbon.

Notes: If you do not have access to Modge Podge, you can use any other kind of clear-drying or relatively clear-drying glue. I would recommend using a spaghetti sauce jar, salsa jar,

peanut butter jar, or mason jar during this craft, but any other kind of clear jar or container you can find around the house will work as well. I would also recommend washing or at least rinsing this jar before using it. For this craft, I would prefer to use twine, but you could also use any kind of thin ribbon. For this project, you could either use fake leaves or real leaves. Just make sure that your leaves are semi- or mostly flexible. Please note that the sheet of paper you will need for this project



can be any old sheet of paper that you are in correspondence with dirtying and eventually throwing away.

Step #1: Place your circular wood slice inside your jar. I glued my wood slice to the bottom of my jar, but this is completely optional and probably unnecessary. If you decided to glue your wood slice to the bottom of your jar, wait for it to dry before proceeding on to the next step. **Step #2:** Place anywhere from 3-5 fake or real leaves on your sheet of paper. Make sure they are lying with their backsides facing up. Open your Modge Podge (or other cleardrying glue) and use your paintbrush to apply a thin layer of Modge Podge on top of each leaf's back. Once they are coated, attach your leaves to the interior walls of your jar with the glues side facing the outside of the jar. Then, wait for all of your glue to fully become dry.

Step #3: Glue the end of your twine spool onto the mouth of your jar. After it is dry, wrap your twine or thin ribbon around the mouth of your jar until it reaches the desired height. Then, trim the ribbon and glue the other end to the jar. Step #4: Place your small batteryoperated candle on top of the wood slice inside of your jar, and enjoy your seasonal craft!

When it comes to making fall jars, there are infinite possibilities. So, follow one or both of these recipes or try creating your own original design! 




Book Reviews










A Complicated Love Story Set in Space by Shaun David Hutchinson


Obsession, Deceit, and Really Dark Chocolate by Kyra Davis


"THE ALIEN AGENDA"


