It takes place on December 30 and December 31, 2022, 3:00 PM - 6:00 PM. The chick drop is at 5:30 and will have fireworks afterward.

Lehigh Valley Mall Pictures with Santa.

Santa is at the Lehigh Valley Mall up until Christmas Eve. He is available for pictures 11 AM - 7 PM on 12/17, 12/19, 12/20, 12/21, 12/22, 12/23, 12 PM - 6 PM on 12/18, and 10 AM - 4 PM on 12/24.

Lights in the Parkway

November 25 to December 31, 2022 hours are 5:30 PM -10:00 PM, excluding Christmas Day. This attraction costs about \$16 per car. It is located in Allentown, PA. There are lots of lights and displays, some of them based on movies.

Koziars Christmas Village

Open every day until January 1, 2023, except for potential closings due to weather, Koziars Christmas Village is located in Bernville, PA. Pricing for ages 0-3 is free, 4-10 is \$10, 11-64 is \$12, and 65+ is \$11. They are open on Holidays too. Friday, Saturday, and Sunday plus Christmas week are Prime Nights where ticket prices are raised by \$5. Monday through Friday hours is 6 PM - 9 PM. Saturday hours are 5 - 10 PM and Sundays are 5 - 9 PM. Koziars is an extraordinary holiday destination with over a million lights, and lots of standing decorations and buildings on display to walk around and see.

winter? The average of the coldest temperature was 3 degrees Fahrenheit.




What will the first snowfall's snow type be? About 34% of people thought that slushy would be the snow type for the first snow storm.

tigated. The threats affected the school's schedule for








One of Us is Lying by Karen M.McManus Age: 14 and up

Summary:



List of Ten by Halli Gomez Age:14 and up TW: Talk of Suicide/Suicide


Summary:

Christmas Sugar Cookies with Easy Icing

Yield: 24 3-inch cookies and 1.5 cups icing

COOKIES

2 and 1/4 cups (281g) all-purpose flour (spoon and leveled)

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

 $3/4 \operatorname{cup}(170 \operatorname{g})$ unsalted butter, slightly softened to room temperature

 $3/4 \operatorname{cup}(150g)$ granulated sugar 1 large egg*

2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract

1/2 teaspoon almond extract (optional, but makes the flavor outstanding)

EASY ICING

3 cups (360g) confectioners' sugar 1/2 teaspoon pure vanilla extract (omit and replace with water for stark white icing)

2 teaspoons light corn syrup*

4.5–5 Tablespoons (67–75ml) room 4. Add the egg, vanilla, and almond temperature water pinch salt* optional: gel food coloring & sprinkles for decorating

1. Make sure you have allotted enough time (and enough counter space!) to make these cookies. The cookie dough needs to chill, the cookies need to cool completely, and the icing needs 24 hours to completely set. If enjoying right away and hardened icing isn't a concern, you'll only need about 3–4 hours to make these.

2. Make the cookie dough: Whisk the flour, baking powder, and salt together in a medium bowl. Set aside.

3. In a large bowl using a hand mixer or a stand mixer fitted with a paddle attachment, beat the butter and sugar together on high speed until completely smooth and creamy, about 2 minutes.



extract (if using), and beat on high speed until combined, about 1 minute. Scrape down the sides and up the bottom of the bowl and beat again as needed to combine.

5. Add the dry ingredients to the wet ingredients and mix on low until combined. Dough will be relatively soft. If the dough seems too soft and sticky for rolling, add 1 more Tablespoon of flour.

6. Divide the dough into 2 equal parts. Place each portion onto a piece of lightly floured parchment paper or a lightly floured silicone baking mat. With a lightly floured rolling pin, roll the dough out to about 1/4-inch thickness. Use more flour if the dough seems too sticky. The rolled-out dough can be any shape, as long as it is evenly



1/4-inch thick.

7. Lightly dust one of the rolled-out doughs with flour. Place a piece of parchment on top. (This prevents sticking.) Place the second rolled-out dough on top. Cover with plastic wrap or aluminum foil, then refrigerate for at least 1-2 hours and up to 2 days.

8. Once chilled, preheat oven to 350°F (177°C). Line 2-3 large baking sheets with parchment paper or silicone baking mats. Carefully remove the top dough piece from the refrigerator. If it's sticking to the bottom, run your hand under it to help remove it. Using a cookie cutter, cut the dough into shapes. Reroll the remaining dough and continue cutting until all is used. Repeat with second piece of dough. (Note: It doesn't seem like a lot of dough, but you get a lot of cookies from the dough scraps you re-roll.)

9. Arrange cookies on baking sheets about 3 inches apart. Bake for 11-12 minutes or until lightly browned around the edges. If your oven has hot spots, rotate the baking sheet halfway through bake time. Allow cookies to cool on the baking sheet for 5 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely before decorating. No need to cover the cookies as they cool.

10. Make the icing: Using a fork, stir the confectioners' sugar, vanilla, corn syrup, and 4.5 Tablespoons (67ml) of water together in a medium bowl. It will be very thick and almost impossible to stir. Switch to a whisk and whisk in 1/2 Tablespoon (8ml) more of water. If you lift the whisk and let the icing drizzle back into the bowl, the ribbon of icing will hold shape for a few seconds before melting back into the icing. That is when you know it's the right consistency and is ready to use. If it's too thick (sometimes it is), whisk in another 1/2 Tablespoon (8ml) of water or a little more until you reach the proper consistency.

If you're tinting the icing another color, stir in the food coloring. You can pour some icing into different bowls if using multiple colors. When tinting icing, use only 1–2 drops at first, stir it in, then add more as needed to reach your desired color. Remember, color darkens as icing dries.

11. Decorate the cookies: You can dip the cookies into the icing or use squeeze bottles or piping bags fitted with piping tips (I usually use Wilton Piping Tip #4). Decorate your cookies as desired. If using the squeeze bottles or piping

tips, I usually outline cookies with icing first, then fill in the middle. If adding sprinkles on top of the icing, add them right after applying





icing on your cookie.

12. Let icing dry/set: Feel free to enjoy cookies before icing completely dries. Icing dries in 24 hours. No need to cover the decorated cookies as you wait for the icing to set. If it's helpful, decorate the cookies directly on a baking sheet so you can place the entire baking sheet in the refrigerator to help slightly speed up the icing setting. Once the icing has dried, these cookies are great for gifting or for sending.

Cover and store decorated cookies for up to 5 days at room temperature or up to 10 days in the refrigerator.


